

Just to give you a hint of the extensiveness of the discoveries, we can say that a sufficient amount of material, including a brilliant sample of Prussian Blue, has been discovered to make an excellent restoration of the house to the Muhlenberg Period of 1776 to 1787.

Dr. William T. Parsons

Born: 1923

Died: 1991

Dr. Parsons was a member of the Trappe Historical Society and, with his wife Phyllis, was a benefactor of the society. He was a generous supporter of the Muhlenberg House.

Together the Parsons' compiled a History of Collegetown and Trappe from writings in *The Independent* by Col. Thomas Swenk and Prof. Henry A. Hunsicker. Not only did the Parsons' contribute the profit from this history to the Muhlenberg House, but they also have given the copyright to the Historical Society of Trappe.

Previously Dr. Parsons presented to the society a Pennsylvania German Banner to be displayed by the society in the Muhlenberg House.

In remembrance of Dr. Parsons, this will be displayed at the Flag Day Dinner.

Dr. Parsons was Professor of History at Ursinus College. He was a former editor of the *Bulletin of the Historical Society of Montgomery County*, from 1961-65 and of *Pennsylvania Folklife* from 1975-82. Dr. Parsons had a long and distinguished record of service to many community and historical organizations throughout eastern Pennsylvania. On a number of occasions, Dr. Parsons was a speaker for the Trappe Society. He was a member of Trinity Reformed Church, Collegetown and he had chosen for his own funeral service the historic 1866 service of the Reformed Church.


Walt Payne & Son Begin Historical Excavations At Muhlenberg House

Walt Payne and his son, Jeff, recently completed the first step, pouring concrete monuments, for the planned historical excavations on the Muhlenberg House property in Trappe.

Payne, who has recently retired from Philadelphia Electric Co. where he was a surveyor, volunteered to lead the archaeological exploration of the site.

Payne, who is president of a computer firm, Data-Cad, said he plans to complete a topographical survey for the site along with full computer mapping of all explorations at the location.

The archaeological explorations will begin this summer.
