Exhibit of The Madonna in Art

On Sunday, December 7th from 1:30 to 4:00 P.M., come to the Dewees Museum of The Historical Society, 301 West Main Street in Trappe, to see the exhibit of The Madonna in Christian Art presented by The Rev. Robert E. Horne, retired Pastor of the Evangelical Lutheran Church of the Trinity, Norristown.

In the course of the year, the Society has noted two events that occurred 255 years ago in 1742, which have had a continuing beneficial influence in the community. The Rev. Henry Melchior Muhlenberg came from Einbeck, Germany, to be the first resident pastor in Providence (now Trappe) serving Augustus Lutheran Church. He preached his first sermon on December 12th. The Rev. John Philip Boehm began his monthly horseback ride from Witpain to found the Reformed Church in Providence (now St. Luke's Church) and gave the first communion in the barn of John Herpel on November 5, 1742.

Therefore, in remembrance of the 255th anniversary of these two events, it is appropriate to have the exhibit of The Madonna, the Mother of Christ, whose ministry brought these two distinguished pastors to Providence. *Continued on page 2*

Henry Melchior Muhlenberg
1777*

December 1, Monday. Had two day laborers in today to split wood. Each gets 5s. a day. In the evening *Commissarius* Robert Dill came from the American camp to say that he had heard that we had, under our house, the largest and best cellar in this neighborhood, and since he had to lay in stores for the winter he asked for permission to use it. I did not dare refuse, for it is a duty to serve friends and foes as one can.

December 2, Tuesday. Today about a dozen wagons arrived from the American camp and brought things for storage in our cellar. Again had a day laborer in. The temporary government in Lancaster has published a proclamation that a day of prayer and thanksgiving should be held in this province, etc., on December 18.

December 6, Saturday. Have day laborers here again to work on the flax. Through Maria Sw[aine] I paid Mr. Ried £4 2s. 6d., in full, for 4½ cords of firewood. To the day laborer Jacob Busch £1 12s., in full, for two days of splitting wood and two days of breaking flax. To Maria Leber 5s., in full, for swingling flax, and repaid Selly 7s. 6d.

Late at night a wagonmaster, a Mr. John Rowan, came; he had a letter for Robert Dill, Esq., in whose *absence* I was to open the letter. I stayed up most of the night—as long as the bitter cold permitted.

December 7, Second Sunday in Advent. The wagonmaster, John Rowan, fetched a hogshead out of the cellar as he was ordered. Today Pastor Voigt conducted the service in Augustus Church, it being the fourth Sunday. This was for us a restless day of rest, for *Commissair* Robert Dill came with six wagons to take the *provisions* from the cellar and transport them to the army. There are now four barrels remaining.

At 2:00 P.M. on December 7th, Pastor Horne will interpret The Madonna in Christian Art as represented from his art collection developed over more than a half century. Pastor Horne will also be present on Sunday, December 14th and 21st, between 1:30 and 4:00 P.M. to talk with visitors to the exhibit.

Pastor Horne's interpretation of the figures, tryptichs, dyptichs, and prints will show how color determines a church-dedicated Madonna as distinguished from one privately owned. The meaning of the nimbus, the influence of nationality upon the artist's style, and the significance of the cherubim and seraphim are discussed. A Madonna to be placed in a church had to have only the two primary colors of red and blue. White could be used, but no other. There was no restriction on the use of color when a Christian painting was used outside the church.

President Hess will greet the visitors and Mrs. Thelma Hess will be in charge of refreshments for the fellowship hour. No admission is charged, but an offering may be given for the work of the museum.

Parking is available behind the Dewees Museum or at the Muhlenberg House, 201 West Main Street.

Visitors from Germany

Sixteen persons from St. Mary Evangelical Lutheran Church, Einbeck, Germany, visited Trappe and Augustus Lutheran Church, which has a sister Church relationship with the St. Mary congregation. St. Mary Church was the home church of Henry Melchior Muhlenberg, in which congregation he was baptized and confirmed.

The Einbeck visitors viewed the Muhlenberg House interior and the Dewees Museum which has Muhlenberg artifacts. A Trappe flag bearing the symbol of the community was presented to each international participant. In 1995, a pilgrimage was made from the Perkiomen Valley to Einbeck and St. Mary Church.



Work Progress

The interior door, window, and mantles with primer coat of paint have been completed. Plaster lathe is now being installed. It is expected that the plastering will begin by December. Doors and hardware will be installed when plastering is completed. Work progresses when enough funds have been given to cover the cost. During restoration, debts have been avoided and thus no interest has had to be paid. Every cent goes into the work.

A HISTORIC SPOT

The Dewees Tavern sits in one corner of the St. Luke's United Church of Christ Cemetery and is the property of the Church. The Society has a 99 year lease from the church for the tavern and approximately forty feet of ground behind the tavern. During the American Revolution the building then the one third toward the road to Rahns, was the home of Andrew Miller the closest neighbor to the Muhlenbergs. The Reformed Cemetery was in the same location as now and the first log church was built on the cemetery ground in 1747. It was used as a hospital during the Revolution. The church bought the house, then known as the Dewees Tavern, near the end of the 19th century completing the ownership of the entire plot of ground.

WINTER EXHIBIT

It is the policy of the museum to rotate its holdings that are in storage. From January until May 15th Andrew Miller section of the museum will feature items that have been in storage, some for a long time. This will include some items that belonged to the Grimison Family and were stored in their outbuildings at what is now Muhlenberg House.

Achieving with Gratitude and Pride

The number of persons participating in the completion of the interior of Muhlenberg House continues to increase and the total is now over \$89,000 toward the goal of \$125,000. It is wonderful that all this has occurred since the Spring of 1997.

Activities of the Leadership Committee

The Leadership Committee is progressing with plans to host another Roundtable in early Spring. The agenda being worked on is a continuation of the work started at the First Roundtable in April, led by Dr. Richard P. Richter.

Lucy A. Ivins, Chairperson, commented, "We were so excited to utilize the Muhlenberg House in April for our first Leadership Development Program and are eagerly awaiting total completion of the interior to welcome the next attendees."

Dr. Ivan Hess, President of the Trappe Historical Society, stated, "Fundraising continues to fuel the restoration. We are grateful to so many for their support and commitment to this work. We look forward to the day the house is completed and it can serve as the site in the Perkiomen Valley for the development of leadership, as well as the center that represents our heritage."

Ivins also pointed out that the next Muhlenberg Leadership Award will be presented in the Spring. Myrna Knaide, serving as the Award Subcommittee Chair, stated, "The Muhlenberg Medal has been awarded four times to recognize those whose faith, vision, integrity, and service exemplifies the lives of the Muhlenberg family."

Knaide also noted that the Leadership Committee is now soliciting nominations for the Muhlenberg Award. 
