Archeological Dig a Great Success!

The archeological dig at the Henry Muhlenberg House created much interest and excitement, with ongoing activity that lasted from June 23rd through July 18th.

The Society partnered with Temple University in this effort at the site of the Summer Kitchen located at the rear of the Henry Muhlenberg House.

Our thanks to Lou Farrell, who led the dig. He has very generously given his time, not only at the dig but by being available to discuss his findings with curious visitors. Lou plans to continue the dig at the Muhlenberg Property next summer—and longer if possible.

Many questions appear to have been resolved and new ones have arisen. We have more findings of iron works on the property next to the summer kitchen. We also have more answers about the kitchen. Items found throughout the dig numbered in the thousands!

We had a great group of volunteers digging and cleaning artifacts, from retirees to our youngest 9-year-old helper, as well as students from the surrounding area—despite the unbearable hot temperatures! The group also had time on rainy days to clean old artifacts from our previous digs.

From the Historian

There are events that happen in a community that become forgotten as time passes. A while back, I received a research request regarding a "Jewish camp" that was located near the Perkiomen Creek in Collegeville. After a few false leads, I happened to stumble upon a small blurb about fifty Jewish refugees, all children, twenty-five boys and twenty-five girls, who were brought

to a camp in Collegeville called "Brith Sholomville" in 1939.

I figured even if this was not the camp I was searching for information on, it was definitely interesting. In the June 8, 1939 issue of the Independent, I found a small article about these fifty young refugees who were brought to the United States from Nazioccupied Vienna. The Independent describes the camp as, "a ninety acre Hebrew camp just west of the borough line." Along with the article in the Independent, I also found one in the June 6, 1939 issue of the Reading Eagle. Both articles gave the same basic information, mainly that the children, who ranged in age from 3 to 13, were going to be acclimated to American cultures and customs, and then sent to live with Philadelphia area foster families. According to the *Independent*, some of the children's parents were Jennifer Moyer-Damiani

planning to join their children later in the year. I later found information about a Camp Sholom, which I deduced was referring to the same place called Brith Sholomville.

This was all fascinating to me, but I still did not know if this was the same camp that was on the map e-mailed to me by the requester. Finally, after "googling" Camp Sholom, I happened upon a United States Geographical Survey topographic map of the Camp Sholom quadrant. This was what I was looking for, something that I could match with the map I already had. When I compared the two maps, everything fit perfectly, and I knew I had a match. The land on which Camp Sholom/ Brith Sholomville stood is now a subdivision. I was amazed that in the span of a few days, I managed to not only find information for a requester, but I also brought some forgotten news to the surface.

If anyone has any information on Camp Sholom or Brith Sholomville, especially regarding the fifty refugees, would you be willing to share it? It would be interesting to find more information regarding the refugees or the camp itself.
